- --Second pick-up point: Twelve Oaks Plaza off SR70 West (approximately ½ mile west of I-75): 10.15am.



Now that we've all reeled
from the annual shock of
the advent of Daylight Saving Time
or "Summer Time," we can relax and
enjoy life again in delightful Sarasota. We had British houseguests
with us last week during the time
change. They were dreading having
to experience the loss of an hour once



again when the UK and the Continent shift to summer time at the end of March. According to a survey reported by Time Magazine and based on Facebook Data Science work using aggregated data to analyze people's sleepy scale in the US following the time change, the tiredest geographical areas were the middle of the country, Florida, and the North East-- with Delaware leading the pack. However, the reported tiredness factor greatly abated during the week; and by Thursday all was back to normal on that scale. ## SANDRA'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

hen we first got married, an American friend of ours warned
Jack to never let me grow rhubarb...as
"the Brits have a thousand and one ways



to fix it!" Well in Wisconson it grew with great abundance, and we enjoyed all the different ways of fixing it. Too hot here in Florida to grow, but can sometimes find it in the produce section, or I have used frozen with success. Here is one of our favourites, ( actually adapted from an Australian cookbook) hope you enjoy it

#### **Rhubarb Crumble**

1/2 lb rhubarb1/4 cup brown sugar1 orange1 tsp ground cinnamon1/2 cup all purpose flour1/2 cup butter

Preheat oven to 400 F. Trim rhubarb into chunks, or if using frozen thaw out. Place in ovenproof dish. Cover with the sugar, and zest and juice of the orange. Bake covered for 10 minutes ( if using frozen rhubarb you can skip this part) Mix cinnamon, sugar, flour and work in the butter until crumbled, sprinkle over the rhubarb; don't pat it down, and bake 20-30 minutes until golden brown. Serve with heavy whipping cream or luverly custard sauce. 8 servings



although tenuous American connection. The last private owner was Phillip Kerr - Lord Lothian, who was the British Ambassador to the United States from 1939 – 1940. Upon his death, Blickling Hall was willed to the National Trust. Lord Lothian was a member of the Catholic aristocracy, but converted to Christian Science. While in Washington, he fell ill of a renal infection, and true to his religious beliefs refused medical treatment; and died of uremic poisoning. He was buried in Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia. #### **Blickling Hall**

ne of the great (meaning beautiful) country houses of England is Blickling Hall, set in rural Norfolk about 13 miles from Norwich. It is a lovely example of Jacobean architecture built between 1616 and 1625 by Sir Henry Hobart. The Jacobean style of the early 17<sup>th</sup> Century was transitioning from the heavy, ponderous aspect of the late Renaissance to something lighter and more fanciful. It is a large structure made in a soft rose red brick, very striking to the eye (in any light) with towers, copper cupolas and a graceful curving façade. The interior boasts of terrific oaken woodwork to include a magnificent staircase and a 120 foot long gallery with intricate plastered ceilings. Many of the rooms were refashioned in the 18th Century to the even lighter and beautiful mode of the Georgian era. The furnishings are very beautiful as well with many tapestries and an extraordinary collection of 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> Century furniture. Despite its age, as you move through the various rooms, it strikes you as being so comfortable and livable, as if the owners had just left the property. It has none of that stodgy, museum quality air that many other homes exude. The grounds are extensive and the gardens magnificent. The gardens were extensively redone by Lord Lothian in the 1930s with sculpted hedges - topiary, and flower beds everywhere.

Blickling Hall is a well known National Trust property, but because of its relative remoteness is not normally overwhelmed by crowds of tourists. The only other notable attraction nearby is the lovely cathedral in Norwich, so one would have to plan a special trip. In fact, in an act of marketing desperation, the National Trust has tried at times to peak interest with things such as fanciful stories of the headless ghost of Anne Boleyn trotting about the property. Anne was born at Blickling, but the structures of her era are long since gone. There is an odd,
