President's Letter

I'm guessing that most of you got up early on a recent Sunday to watch Andy Murray ruin all future tennis headlines about the failure of a Brit to win the world's greatest tennis tournament. He was magnificent, the match was engrossing and I'm sure everybody's blood pressure went up a few notches. For years, it was all about Henman, the nice boy who was simply too nice, and the British public were desperate for somebody to take over from Tim. This takeover culminated in Murray's win, though Henman Hill had already been renamed Murray Mound a few years ago, so our hearts were already elsewhere.



One thing I've noticed over the years is the willingness of the British public to be English, Irish, Scottish or Welsh as the occasion demands, yet come together over certain sporting events as Brits.

Recently, I've been following the magnificent exploits of the British and Irish Lions in Australia and it took me back to 2005, when I, along with over 30,000 other Brits, followed the Lions to disaster in New Zealand. It was fantastic to be part of a British band of brothers (and a couple of sisters), with the differences of our patriotic heritage present but not problematic. We were all Lions and rugby seemed to have a unifying effect.

Contrast this with the wife of an old friend of mine. Brendan (you can see where this is going) and Viv were born and bred in Ilford, of Southern Irish parents, and you would have thought that they were held captive in England by the way they demonstrated their sporting favors. Indeed, Viv had a T Shirt that proudly proclaimed "I support two teams - Ireland and any team playing England."

It may be that it is part of the undeniable unpleasantness surrounding the game of football. I recall England winning the World Cup in 1966 and the great Dennis Law, Scottish to his boots, preferring to play golf rather than chance watching England win the cup. I always thought that was a miserable attitude. In fact, whenever England were knocked out of the cup in the early stages in later tournaments, I would blithely switch allegiance to Scotland or Ireland (the Welsh would rarely, if ever, outlast even the pitiful English). I know of very few Celts who would perform such an about turn.

For me, I was more British than English, while I suspect that the same isn't true for the other constituent parts of our funny little islands anchored just off Europe. I'm told that Bannockburn and Oliver Cromwell may have had something to do with these harbored grudges that manifest themselves these days at certain sporting events. As a reader of history, if the boot was on the other foot, I'm sure I would feel the same.

Whatever is going on, however, there is nothing more exciting to a sports fan than rivalries founded years ago over real and sometimes perceived injustices. These provide fans with a wonderful backdrop to a gladiatorial contest that, without that

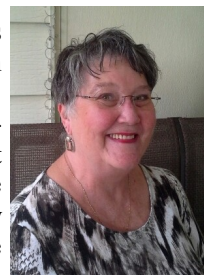
context, would otherwise be just another game.

A lvely light summer dessert, was named after the famous Russian Ballerina Anna Pavlova in the '20's, when she was visiting Australia. I must admit that making right meringue can be a bit challenging in Florida, I intensely dislike the 'meringue' that is featured here, a gooey soft mess...but the traditional way should be a lovely crisp outer shell and soft inside.



You need to use a glass or metal clean bowl to whip up the egg whites, a plastic bowl will not work. Any kind of fruit can be used, and we certainly have a great choice right now. Also you can be really decadent and use clotted cream for the base, now available easily. If not plain heavy whipping cream can be used, but you can't assemble it all until just before serving or it will make the meringue soft and watery. Hope you enjoy my version.

Pavlova

- 6 egg whites at room temperature
- 3/4 tsp cream of tartar
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 2 cups fine granulated sugar
- 1 cup confectioners sugar
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream

Line a baking sheet with waxed or parchment paper. Preheat oven to 275 degrees F. Put the egg whites and cream of tartar in mixing bowl, and whip on high speed until whites gradually begin to mound. Add sugar gradually beating well after each addition until sugar is dissolved and egg whites are stiff. Spoon onto prepared baking tray, and spread to desired shape to about 1 1/2 inch thickness. Bake at 275 for 1-2 hours, until lightly golden brown and crisp to the touch. Turn off oven but leave in until ready to serve. Spread with the cream, and top with fruit, such as strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, etc

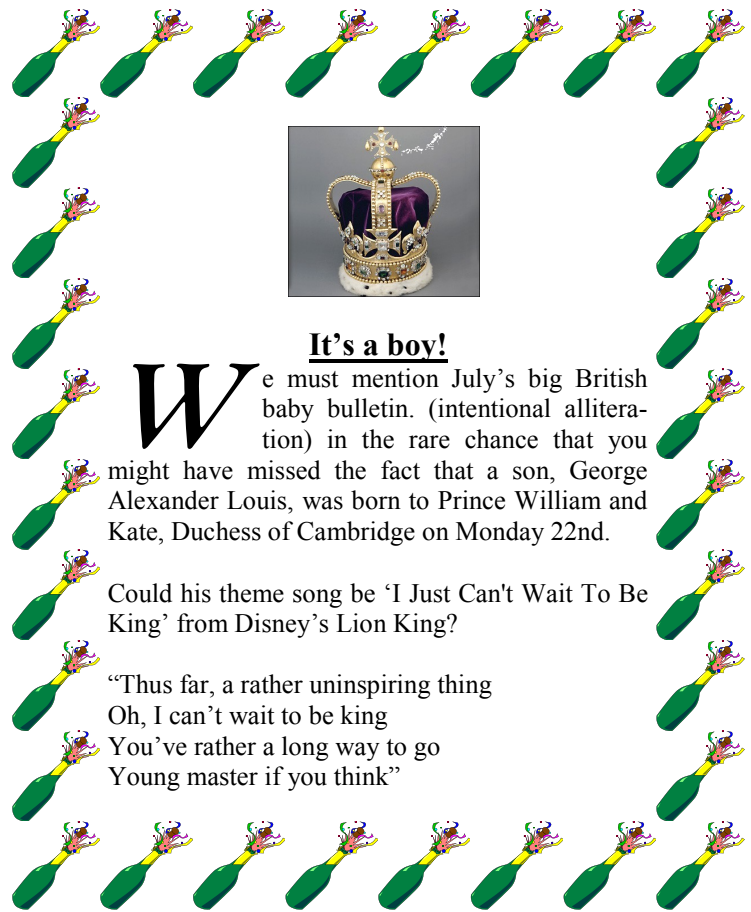

Born in Yorkshire, England, Iain started ballet at the age of 14 and moved to London at 16, where he trained for two years with The Rambert School of Ballet, a year at The Royal Ballet School and a further year as an apprentice with The Sadler's Wells Royal Ballet where he was offered a full time position. His main principal repertoire included Ashton's *The Dream*, *The Two Pigeons*, *La Fille mal Gardee* (Colas & Alain), *Bintleys The Snow Queen*, *Fokine's Les Sylphides* and *Petrushka*, *Balanchine's The Prodigal Son*, *van Manen's Five Tangos*, *Coppelia* and *Swan Lake*.

In 1989 he transferred to The Royal Ballet, Covent Garden, to perform character roles which included Bottom in Ashton's *The Dream*, *The Small Sister*, *Dancing Master & Napoleon* in *Cinderella*, and *Mrs. Tiggy-Winkle* and *Pigling Bland* in *Tales of Beatrix Potter*, *MacMillan's The Doctor in Different Drummer* and a *Client* in *Manon* and *Sancho Panza* in *Baryshnikov's* production of *Don Quixote*. In 1996, Webb retired from The Royal Ballet, but was invited back as a guest artist to give three farewell performances at Covent Garden as the *Small Sister* in Ashton's *Cinderella*. After retiring as a dancer, he was invited by Matthew Bourne to be Rehearsal Director for The West End, L.A. and Broadway seasons of *Swan Lake* and continued to work with Bourne on his production of *Cinderella*.

In 1999, Webb was asked by Tetsuya Kumakawa to join his newly formed K-Ballet Company in Japan as Ballet Master and two years later was appointed Assistant Director. During this time he also worked with many international stars including Adam Cooper, with whom he co-directed *The Adam Cooper Company* and organized their tour to The Kennedy Center. Likewise, he co-produced with Johan Kobborg the London performances of *Out of Denmark* and staged Roland Petit's *Carmen Pas de Deux* for Alessandra Ferri & Julio Bocca for American Ballet Theatre's 65th Anniversary Gala. Throughout Iain's career he has produced and directed many international performances which included presenting dancers from Royal Danish Ballet, Paris Opera Ballet, New York City Ballet and Stuttgart Ballet to name a few. He has been guest teacher for White Oak Project,

Birmingham Royal Ballet, Rambert Dance Company, as well as teaching master classes and workshops for all the major ballet schools in England.

In July 2007, Webb took over the directorship of The Sarasota Ballet and during the last four seasons the company has performed 102 ballets & divertissements which include 16 world premieres, 55 Sarasota premieres, 4 new productions and 27 American premieres. These include ballets by: Ashton, de Valois', MacMillan, Balanchine, Cranko, Tudor, van Manen, Bourne, Wheeldon, Tharp and Tuckett. Under Webb's direction the company has received critical acclaim in *The New York Times*, *The New York Financial Times*, *Sarasota Herald Tribune*, *St. Petersburg Times*, *Orlando Sentinel*, *Dancing Times* (London); He has developed a stronger financial foundation for the company, was selected to serve on the National Endowment for the Arts Dance Panel and recently signed a contract extending his tenure six more years.

Kayak Outing on Little Sarasota Bay

The Bay beckons adventurous souls for a three-hour jaunt on the low seas! Our excursion begins at the water's end of Vamo Drive, a RIGHT turn nine-tenths of a mile down Vamo Road from its intersection with RT 41 and Beneva Road. You'll be met by our professional guide John Sarkozy, who has many years of experience running local kayak trips under the auspices of the American Littoral Society <http://littoralsociety.org> and our Event Coordinator, Mark Malkasian. Please arrive by 8:30am on Saturday, October 26, 2013 with launching planned for 9am.



The route will take us at its furthest point to Palmer Point Park, normally only accessible by boat or foot, on the southern end of Siesta Key <http://discovernatualsarasota.org/listing/palmer-point-park-siesta-key>. In addition to our visit to the park, there will be upwards of two stops – usually one at Bay Preserve in Osprey where there are two rest rooms – during the round trip. Our return to launch point should be approximately at noon.

John provides all the necessary equipment and safety gear and especially welcomes first time kayakers on his silent seas adventures. In a matter of minutes he'll have you quite comfortable on the water. He can accommodate up to 11 paddlers in single kayaks and two-somes in up to three double kayaks or 17 guests in total.

Fees are \$25 per person, \$5 if you are a member of ALS or \$5 if you bring your own kayak. Recommended personal items are: a sun hat, plenty of water, sunscreen, quick-dry clothing and shoes that you don't mind getting wet. John usually has granola bars for the Park stop.

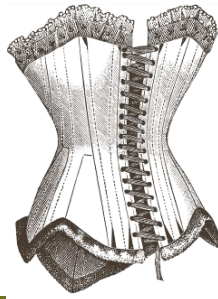
Apres-kayaking we will adjourn for lunch at a nearby eatery most likely on Rt 41.
