a simple touch to Valentine's Day is painting stem glasses with a few small hearts.

Use acrylic paints, or a permanent red felt tip pen: they can be cleaned up later with hot vinegar, soap and water, or mineral spirits. Using a small heartshaped cookie cutter, cut hearts out of slices of watermelon. Slip some in the glasses, add a favourite punch such as white wine, and ginger ale, or a non-alcoholic




lemonade and white grape juice combo. Pop a melon heart on a bamboo skewer and add it to the glass. With some left-over serviettes from Christmas, or red craft paper cut out heart shapes and use for coasters. 

Cookery Corner

Eccles Cakes

Eccles cakes were popular in the 1700's when they were banned by the Puritans for being "too sinfully rich". They were restored in the 1800's in the town of Eccles, south Manchester area. This really is not hard to make and sooo good!! Hope you like my version

3 Tbsp butter 1/2 tsp all spice 3 Tbsp sugar $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp nutmeg


½ cup currants 1 lb puff pasty (Frozen is good and easy)

1 ½ tsp mixed peel

Mix butter, sugar, currants, peel and spices in a small saucepan, put on low heat until sugar is melted. Transfer to a bowl and allow to cool. Roll out pastry and cut into 3-4" circles. Place 1 Tbsp of cooled cooked filling in centre of each circle, dampen the outer rim of the pastry, and gently pull up pastry, pinching edges together. Turn over and gently flatten. Make three small slits in the top with a sharp knife. Place on lightly greased baking sheet, brush with egg wash, and bake at 400 degrees F for 15-20 minutes. Cool and sprinkle with fine sugar
