SANDRA'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Potato Leek Soup



This is a favourite recipe from my dear Irish friend, and is always popular. I felt as at time of writing it was wee bit chilly, this is an ideal recipe for the cooler weather (but also delicious all year!)

- 4 Leeks 2 medium
- 2 medium potatoes
- 4 Tbsp butter
- 2 Tbsp flour
- 4 cups chicken stock
- 4 sprigs of parsley
- 1 Bay leaf
- 1/4 tsp nutmeg
- Salt and pepper
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup half and half

Slice the white parts of the leeks and wash well in salted cold water. Peel and slice the potatoes finely. Melt the butter and add the potatoes and drained leeks, cook gently for 5 minutes stirring to prevent sticking and browning. Sprinkle in the flour. When thoroughly mixed add the stock gradually, herbs and seasoning. Bring to a boil, stirring, then lower heat and simmer gently for 30 minutes until vegetables are tender. Blend the soup in a blender (may want to cool it first) re-heat and adjust the seasoning. Heat milk and half and half in a separate pan to just below boiling point before adding it to the pureed soup. Sprinkle with parsley when serving. Freezes well Yield 4-6 servings

Kayak Outing on the Intracoastal Waterway in Nokomis Please note checks, preference for kayak type (single or double) and lunch commitments are due by Wednesday, March



If you missed our kayak outing last fall or were one of the lucky few who didn't here's another opportunity to experience our next silent seas adventure. This time our professional guide, John Sarkozy, who has nearly 20 years of experience in running local kayak trips under the auspices of the American Littoral Society http://www.littoralsociety.org/index.php/trips-a-events/sarasota. will be guiding us along the "Waterways of Nokomis".

We'll undertake a leisurely North to South figure-eight route among the small islands, mangroves and sand bars dotting the ICW along Casey Key. There will be one "wilderness stop" during our three-hour journey of paddling and observation.

DATE and TIME: Wednesday, **March 26**, 2014. Please arrive by **9am** to be prepared for our launching at 9:30.

DIRECTIONS to the Launch Site: In Nokomis on Rt 41 turn west onto Albee Rd, proceed 0.9 miles over the ICW bridge, turn right onto Casey Key Rd. and then immediately turn right around a wooden & chain link fence and then over a short bridge and finally turn left continuing along the dirt road approx. 0.1 miles to a break in the mangroves on the left marked by a wooden fence.

John provides all the necessary equipment and safety gear and especially welcomes first time kayakers. As he did for several newbies last year, he'll have you quite comfortable on the water in a matter of minutes. He can accommodate up to 11 paddlers in single kayaks and two-somes in up to three double (tandem) kayaks or 17 guests in total.

Fees are \$25 per person, \$20 if you are a member of ALS or \$5 if you bring your own kayak and life vest. Recommended personal items are: a sun hat, plenty of water, sunscreen, quickdry clothing and shoes that you don't mind getting wet. John usually has granola bars for the rest stop.

Après-kayaking we will adjourn for lunch at a quite nearby, waterfront eatery most likely Pop's Sunset Grille.



Who recalls actor Conrad Phillips? See picture on page 4.

Born Conrad Phillip Havord in London in 1925, he was brought up largely by his mother as his father was usually absent.

He joined the Navy in 1942, lying about his age. After the war he studied at RADA (the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art)

He is best known for playing the title role in the British television series 'The Adventures of William Tell', which ran for 39 episodes in 1958-9

However, he also appeared in the theatre, films and other television plays

Ill health – in particular various injuries suffered during the course of his career - obliged him to give up acting in 1991. His first marriage, from which he has a son, ended in divorce; he met his second wife, Jennie, in 1968 during a shoot for a commercial.

After retirement, he and his wife bought and ran a Scottish hill farm, Skeoch, about which Jennie has written a book. They subsequently moved to France and spent 20 years restoring an old barn

The couple now live in Chippenham, in southern England. Having published his autobiography, 'Aiming True', Phillips is currently working on a novel.

The Ealing Comedies

Almost any Briton or Anglophile of a certain age will immediately relate to the phrase "The Ealing Comedies". Ealing Studios is a London based film company which started in 1902 and is active to this present day. In its 110 year history it has turned out a huge number of films, but the "Comedies" referred to were a series of 17 films produced between 1947 and 1957. Devotees have considered some of these as the finest comedies ever made. Many of these films used a repertory of directors and actors, the actors including Alec Guinness, Alistair Sim, Stanley Holloway and Margaret Rutherford. Following are four recommended favorites of the Ealing Comedies.

Kind Hearts and Coronets (1949) – a black comedy of manners and murders set in Edwardian England. It is presented mostly as a flashback by the 10th Duke of Chalfont writing his memoirs in prison awaiting his execution for committing the murder of a man he did not actually kill. However, our hero was the poor relation far down the pecking order of inheritance of the dukedom and chose to and did "remove" numerous of his relations that stood in his way. Alec Guinness plays eight separate roles of family members that our hero must eliminate. This is an extraordinary film and a must see for everyone.

The Lavender Hill Mob (1951) – a farce involving a heist of gold bars where our hero (Alec Guinness) plays a timid bank clerk who for twenty years has accompanied and accounted for his bank's bullion shipments. Yearning for the good life, he assembles a "mob" to steal the gold with a view to melt it down and smuggle it out of the country. The film also stars the fa-

mous Stanley Holloway as one of mob. Of course, their plans go awry with hilarious results.

Barnacle Bill (1957) – another farce also starring Alec Guinness who is descended from a long line of mariners. His own World War II efforts as a Royal Navy officer were limited by his violent tendency towards sea sickness, thus his wartime efforts consisted of his testing cures for that malady. Post-war our hero purchases and takes command of an ocean side amusement pier and christens it as a ship as to accommodate patrons also suffering from sea sickness. In historical flashbacks, Alec Guinness also plays his ancestors beginning with a caveman. This is another brilliant film though not currently available in the Region 1 DVD format used in North America. However, many DVD players today are capable of playing both the video standard used in the US and in Britain.

Passport to Pimlico (1949) – a farce starring Stanley Holloway and Margaret Rutherford. A few years after the war an unexploded German aerial bomb uncovers an ancient vault located in the district of Pimlico in central London. In the vault is a royal charter signed by King Edward IV granting the area to the Charles VII, the Duke of Burgundy. As the charter was never revoked, the residents of Pimlico are legally Burgundians and have to locate the ducal heir, form a government and defend their borders from Great Britain. There follows an hilarious series of events to include black market avoidance of rationing, closed borders, blockades, and airlifts of food to our besieged heroes (mimicking the then ongoing Berlin airlift to thwart the Russian blockade).
