SANDRA'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Asparagus used to be a real treat to have in England, a lot had to do with it's availability, but now it is grown year round and usually can be found any time of the year. I love any soups, but this has to be one of my favourites, hope you enjoy my version . It can be served hot or chilled



Asparagus Soup

 $1\ \text{lb.}$ As paragus tips (the stalks can be tough and not blend well)

3 cups chicken stock 1/4 cup butter 2 peeled and chopped shallots 3Tbsp flour 2 cups milk1/3 cup cream salt and pepper 1-2 Tbsp. Lemon juice

Wash and trim asparagus, and simmer in the chicken stock until just softened, (need a bit of texture with them). Drain, reserving the stock. Sauté the shallots over medium heat, in the butter until softened (not brown) in a large saucepan, add the flour and stir until smooth. and gradually add the stock stirring all the time to make a smooth sauce (will be thin) Stir in the partially cooked asparagus, salt and pepper and lemon juice, and simmer for about 30 minutes. Allow to cool, then process in batches in processor or blender until smooth. Add the milk and cream

Yield: About 6 servings



Market Update from MONEYCORP MAY 1ST TO DATE: - POUND SHOWS SIGNS OF LIFE

The British Pound jumped to a two month high against the US Dollar on the back of news that the UK had managed to avoid dropping back into recession in the first quarter of this year. Whilst a modest 0.3% growth was achieved in Q1, this was stronger than the 0.1% expected. If the UK had fallen back into recession it would have been the third time in the last five years. The news is also likely to diminish the chances of the Bank of England increasing its level of quantitative easing.

In the short term the Pound will look to regain some of its losses against the Dollar and the Euro from the early part of this year. The Pound has by far been the worst performing major currency of 2013, whilst investors in the currency will be hoping that the small boost it received this week will help kick start it.

While the UK shows a small sign of growth in the first quarter this year, the US economy also expanded. Commerce Department figures show that the US economy grew 2.5% in Q1. Consumer spending, the driving force behind the economy, rose 3.2%, which is the sharpest gain for over two years, however part of the increase was due to higher oil prices.

The housing market also gave the economy a lift again. Spending on home construction surged 12.6%, following gains of nearly 18% and 14% in the prior two periods.

However, government spending fell 4.1%, mainly due to further large cuts in federal defense spending. Further broad government spending cuts are expected to weigh on the economy for the remainder of the year, whilst higher taxes have started to make some consumers and business slightly cautious.

Economists remain positive on the US economic outlook for the rest of the year. But whilst any growth is always welcome, many see that with the pace of growth starting out strong in Q1, it may weaken and will be hard to sustain throughout the remainder of 2013.

Some economists predict the Euro area's economy to shrink 0.7% this year. It's also expected that the European Central bank will be cutting interest rates again in the near future. ECB President Mario Draghi recently explained that the economic situation in the Euro area hasn't improved since the Central bank's last policy meeting on April 4th. The ECB's benchmark rate is currently 0.75%

Check for Your Unclaimed Property before the Statewide Auction on June 8

More than 76,000 items, including jewelry, watches, and rare coins, will be auctioned.

Florida Chief Financial Officer Jeff Atwater has asked Floridians to check for unclaimed property prior to his Bureau of Unclaimed Property's statewide auction, an annual sale of unclaimed safe deposit box contents turned over to the state. The auction, which is open to the public, will be held June 8 in Tampa at the Grand Hyatt Hotel.

"I encourage all Floridians to visit FLTreasureHunt.org and see what property they may have waiting," said CFO Atwater. "I am proud of the employees who work hard to return millions in unclaimed property every year. It is my goal to raise awareness about the program so that every last dime is returned to its rightful owner."
