## **President's Letter**

I'm aware that my first introduction to Club members came when I spoke of my love, my complete, illogical and entirely irrational love for Southend United last year. This is



not meant to be an explanation or analysis of that love, as every true sports fan understands the basis of it, even if they wouldn't entirely understand Southend being the object of it. No, this is a moment of celebration that I've waited over 50 years for and one that I intend to live to the full.

I started standing on the terraces at Roots Hall, the Theatre of Nightmares, with my Dad in 1959, on what seemed to be a freezing day at some time in the middle of winter. I vaguely recall a 0-0 draw with Lincoln City, though I can't be sure. In the intervening years, my Dad and I moved our position to various locations on the ground to meet not only our growing affluence, but also our need to carefully consider the nuances of football (sic) from an alternative perspective, as it applies to the lower reaches of what were then referred to as Divisions 3 and 4 of the Football League.

We braved the freezing November fog for the first and second rounds of the FA Cup in the distant hope of inclusion in the 3rd round draw, when the big teams were included. I distinctly remember hearing that, after a 1-1 draw at Watford, the winners were paired with mighty Liverpool in 1976. Consequently, we had the anticipation of the Watford replay the following Wednesday, combined with the pot of gold of Liverpool at home in early January. We beat Watford 1-0 with an Andy Polycarpou goal to match up with Liverpool and 31,000 people packed into Roots Hall, many not until half time, as the Mighty Blues (we were the Mighty Blues years before Chelsea) battled to a 0-0 draw with the Champions.

Even when I moved to New York, I flew back for many games, notoriously including the League Cup game against Manchester United, for which I managed to miss the teams coming out, the Freddie Eastwood free kick goal that turned out to be the only goal of the match and the entire first half due to an entirely typical British Rail incident. So, traveling thousands of miles for 45 minutes of a game qualifies me as a fan.

All this nostalgia is leading me to record my joy last night, and still with me as I write, as the Mighty Blues scored a last minute equalizer against Leyton Orient to take a 3-2 aggregate win in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy Southern Area Final and qualify for the Final at WEM-BER-LEEE in April. I've been to the final before when it was at Cardiff, but every fan will understand how I'm going to feel when Paul Sturrock leads Southend out at Wembley on April 7th.

I'll be thinking of my dear old Dad and will doubtless shed a tear or two, but I'm going to enjoy every moment of the day with my niece. America has given me a great deal, including

my lovely wife, but the pull of my youth will give me a moment for my lifetime that I'll always cherish and I'll have to be back in the UK for that special moment.

## SANDRA'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

## **BoBotie**

L came to the States in 1966, and at the same time my brother moved to South Africa, and when we visited them a while back we really enjoyed the diversity of foods. BoBotie is a traditional meal, and we have been using my niece's version for a long time. Hope you enjoy it too!

medium onion
Tbsp cooking oil
lb ground beef
1/4 cup soft breadcrumbs
tsp curry powder
tsp sugar
salt and pepper
tsp turmeric
Tbsp vinegar
1/2 cup seedless raisins
cup milk
lemon
eggs



Heat oven to 350F. Chop onion finely, heat oil, and sauté onion until golden brown. Remove from stove. Add meat and breadcrumbs and sauté until brown. Add curry, sugar, salt and pepper, turmeric, vinegar and raisins, mix well, and place in a lightly greased baking dish. Grate lemon rind and sprinkle over the meat mixture. Bake for 30 minutes. Beat egg and milk, pour over top of Bobotie, and bake another 15 minutes. Serve with vellow rice and chutney. Serves 4-6.

## **Précised Minutes of the** Sarasota British Club Board Meeting of February 7th, 2013 eeting was held in the home of Sue and Roy Ford. Membership stands at 233 of which 31 are single memberships. An on-line membership application/ renewal feature will be considered in the on-going revamp of the club website. It was agreed that a password control measure would be implemented to safeguard the membership list. The treasury balance stands at \$8005 after posting income and expenses for the recent Christmas and President 's Parties and the upcoming Movie Night on March 16 at the Lakewood Ranch Cinema. The 2012 charitable gift check of \$1500 has been cut and is awaiting suitable presentation to the Southeastern Guide Dogs in Bradenton. Forty-one members and guests attended the President's Party that was a lively, dance filled affair at Lakewood Ranch. Fifteen members have signed up for the Spanish Point Museum tour on February 20 and 40 of the 50 available bus seats to Tampa Downs on April 20 are spoken for. A subcommittee of board members will be formed to layout the budget for the coming year and advise the Board by April as to the appropriate reserve funding levels that should be maintained by the club. The four-member subcommittee will also recommend club-subsidized member giveback activities for Board consideration. Preliminary Event Chair assignments were agreed upon to begin the fleshing out of the calendar of events for the remainder of the year. "Thanks," said the grandfather, "but I'm William -- the little \*\*\*\*'s name is Kevin."



## MONEYCORP CURRENCY UPDATE dated 28th February.

## British Pound takes 'a pound'...

he Pound's poor start to 2013 continued through February. Since the beginning of the year the Pound has lost over 6% against the Euro and the US Dollar making it the worst performing currency this year. The GBP/USD rate recently hit its lowest rate since June 2010.

It appears that the Bank of England and Government are more than happy to have a low Pound at present, assuming they are hoping this will lead to a rise in the output of exports of goods and services which gives us an outside chance of avoiding the 'triple dip' recession.

Outgoing Bank of England Governor Mervyn King wanted the bank to increase its QE program during the latest Monetary Policy Committee meeting but was outvoted 6-3 from its current amount of �375bn. However, the general consensus is for further QE around the corner which could continue to affect the Pound.

No doubt confidence in the Pound has been sapped over the last few months - the threat of a triple dip recession and Prime Minister David Cameron's recent announcement that a referendum would help decide the UK's future participation in the EU have weighed on the minds of investors in the Pound. Recent news of UK losing its AAA rating with credit agency Moody's has further cast a grim short term outlook on the currency.

The same can't be said for the US Dollar however. Since the complicated matter of the Fiscal Cliff being resolved at the end of 2012, the Dollar has not looked back since.

The Greenback has been supported by positive tones from Washington regarding the economy and backed up with supportive data. There has also been talk that US's own QE program may come to an end sooner than expected.

In other news out of the States, The National Association of Realtors said on Thursday 22nd Feb that existing home sales rose 0.4% last month to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.92 million units. However, the supply was left at a 13 year low. The nation's inventory of existing homes for sale, fell 4.9% from December to 1.74 million, the lowest level since December 1999.

The Euro suffered a mid-month hit as growth figures from German, French, Italian and the Eurozone as a whole dropped far more sharply than anticipated. The European Central bank

President Mario Draghi has again stated that stabilizing the bank system in Europe will lead to a bright future for the single currency.

Also in the news during February was that the Eurozone will not return to growth until 2014, the European commission said recently, reversing its prediction for an end to recession this year and blaming a lack of bank lending and record joblessness for delaying the recovery.

According to reports, the Eurozone will shrink 0.3% in 2013, the commission said, meaning the Eurozone will remain in its second recession since 2009 for a year longer than originally foreseen.
