s I mentioned in a previous letter, I returned to England recently to watch my team play at Wembley for the first time in a domestic final. It was a visit that I won't easily forget, though not for the football, as we lost in a dreadful display that was strangely comforting and not the



least surprising to somebody who has supported Southend Cheers, United since 1959. No, the reason for the memorable visit was the people, both friends and family, who made the trip so Steve Adams memorable for me.

I hadn't been back in the UK for quite a while, so hadn't seen many of my friends for several years, while visits with family had also been somewhat sporadic. However, I was shoehorning the trip into only three days, so I had planned to meet up with a couple of mates in the City after landing at Heathrow on the Friday morning. With only carry-on to deal with. I was able to sweep through British customs using my UK passport (dual Citizenship is SUCH a benefit), then waited only two minutes on the platform for the Heathrow Express into Paddington.

Getting to an old favorite bar in the City, I had expected only two mates to be there, so was somewhat taken aback by a posse that included several now-retired pals from years gone by, as well as others I had almost lost touch with. It was great and, as always in the City, catching up can only be done with copious amounts of wine, which need to be soaked up by huge sandwiches.

I eventually made my excuses and had to get away to meet up with friends I was staying with for the night. My old mate, Jim, picked me up at the station and drove me to his home, where I was ambushed by even older friends, who had driven 260 miles from Cornwall to come and surprise me. It was great. A local Chinese meal, followed the next morning by a massive, full English breakfast, took me nearer to my destination, sunny Southend.

I was meeting my son, with whom I've always had a rather rocky relationship, though this was the best time I've had with him since before he could answer me back. Once again, a few pints provided the backdrop.

I was now aware that the football was only going to be incidental to the weekend and that these people were the real reason I was here. I'd forgotten the binds that are able to stretch across an ocean and that persist even when you don't see somebody for weeks, months or years. It was extremely gratifying for my soul to know that these people thought enough of me to share my weekend and to be pivotal to it.

After seeing my son, I had a great evening out with my footballing soulmate, my niece, along with her husband and two gorgeous kids, while my son even joined us for part of the evening. I was basking in familial love by now and absorbing every moment.

Glossing over the football the next day, at which I met even more of my old mates for yet another drink after the game, I

ended up at my only surviving brother's home, along with my other niece and her husband. It was perfect and, arriving back home in lovely Florida, I reflected on how lucky I am, as many of us are, that we have family in two places and that no matter how far we are away from them, they always want to see us. For that, I am profoundly grateful and can't wait to see if another final draws me back to them all next year.



SANDRA'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Cheese and Onion Pie

ure simplicity, and easy!! A very basic British favourite, good hot or cold



You can use any cheese but I favour sharp Cheddar. I'm still experimenting with pastry

recipes, but you can 'cheat' if you want and use the store bought. Hope you enjoy my version.

1 lb. thinly peeled and sliced yellow onions 1 3/4-2 cups grated sharp Cheddar cheese 1/2 tsp. nutmeg salt and pepper Short crust pastry, enough for bottom and top pie 1 Tbsp. milk

Put onions in saucepan, cover with water and bring to gentle boil, cook 10 minutes or until tender. Drain thoroughly and mash up with a potato masher, add the grated cheese

and seasonings. Preheat oven to 425 F. Line a lightly greased 9" pie pan with pastry, fill with the onion cheese mix, and top with layer of pastry, dampen the edges of the pastry and pinch together to seal. Brush the top of the pastry with the milk and cut a few slits in the top.

Bake 10 minutes, then reduce heat to 375, and bake further 25minutes. until cooked and golden 30 brown. Yields 4 servings.

(Variations: can add layer of finely sliced peeled and sliced potatoes at bottom of pastry shell before adding the cheese mixture. Can also add sliced tomatoes)

I am a Board Member for Family Partnership Center (FPC), an slowly reached into her cleavage extraordinary group of professionals who are dedicated to improving the lives of the people we serve. The Center provides a number of free programs to improve parenting skills amongst families most at risk. I am happy to report FPC's outcome successes continually exceed 95%, which is extraordinary.

But we're consistently facing new challenges. In 2012, there were smile, seductively reached into her 4,236 reports of child abuse in Manatee County alone, which is a significantly higher rate than the state average. We serve roughly 3,300 parents and children annually. An alarming 80% of the families served fall below the poverty level, which is the #1 risk up?" factor for child abuse.

Though our services are free to the families we serve, they do not come without a price and that's why we need your help. During a time of severe government cut backs and reduced community donations, we are faced with difficult realities. As you consider a donation, know that the Center commits 88 cents of each dollar to prevention programs. Research shows that every \$1 spent on prevention could save \$10 in treatment.

Please consider whether you can afford to help FPC reach even more families and continue our cause to eliminate child abuse in our area.

I expect you receive your share of impersonal requests for money, and I also know that there are many great causes out there. However, I hope you'll agree that absolutely nothing can be more important to our future well-being as a community than saving our kids from the unimaginable experience of child abuse and giving them the opportunity to grow up as contributing members of society.



hank you to the 56 people that responded. As family memberships are represented by a single email address it is likely that the results represent a larger number of members.


The survey is anonymous.
