#### **President's Letter**

utumn has come to our lovely part of Florida. We can at last open windows and sliders wide and enjoy the fresh, cooler air. Last year at this time, we were in Vail, Colorado where the aspen trees still had their bright golden autumn leaves. And against the back drop of surrounding



peaks, white with early snow, those leaves played magnificently. Later on that same trip, we spent several days with longstanding friends in the Boulder area, where we enjoyed a riot of color among the trees and shrubs, again resplendent against the distant, eastern Rocky Mountain range.

Recalling that Colorado trip brought to mind our frequent visits to the Blue Ridge Parkway area in Virginia for hiking when we lived in the Washington, D.C. area. The Parkway and hiking trails could be reached in 2 hours or so, so one could easily go for a nice hike and enjoy the spectacular autumn colors and get back home in time for a late afternoon or evening activity. Too, with another couple or two, we often booked for a weekend or so, one of the rustic cabins along the trail that are maintained by the Appalachian Trail Club in Washington. These cabins are near hiking trails and used to cost only \$1.50 per night per person. room. Doubtlessly, the tariff has increased as this goes back more than 30 years. The cabins provided bunks for 6 or more campers (who had to bring their own sheets and pillow cases of course or use sleeping bags. Simple mattresses 1 onion were stored in wired cages.) Also, at least two kerosene 2 Tbsp butter lanterns were provided since the cabins had no electric 2 cups prepared pumpkin power. Too, cabins were usually situated near a spring or 1 3/4 cup chicken stock stream, where provisions could be stored. Only once did 1 1/2 cup water other hikers not respect the rules of the road and made off 1 Tbsp oil with some of our supplies.

We hiked in our own provisions (including copious 1 tsp sugar amounts of wine, of course) and cooked either on a wood 1/2 tsp thyme burning stove or over an open fireplace. The deal was that 1/4 tsp nutmeg campers were obliged to forage for their own wood for 1/4 cup cream cooking and heat. The wood could not be cut from live trees--only wood found lying about the surrounding forest. The rule was that at the end of each rental period, the departing party was obliged to leave enough wood for the first pumpkin, chicken stock, water, seasoning, Bay leaf, sugar, fire of the next renters. A simple privy was located usually a hundred vards or so near each cabin. If one ventured out after dark, the myriad eyes of deer grazing near the cabin were reflected as floating, golden objects. It was all magical and quite wonderful. We enjoyed these occasions immensely. When staying in these cabins for several days, the routine was to have breakfast, pack a lunch, and strike out for a 6-7 hour hike along wooded trails, only occasionally getting a good view of valleys, etc. along the way. If in

summer-on route back to the cabin, one could strip off and dive into a mountain pool of ice cold water for a refreshing shower as there was no water at all in the cabins. What wonderful memories that I haven't thought of in years.....

#### **Pumpkin Soup:**

Salt and pepper 1 Bay leaf



Chop onion, sauté in melted butter and oil until soft. Add thyme and nutmeg. Simmer on low 30-45 minutes and remove bay leaf. Puree in processor, and add cream before serving.



There is a long tradition of Welsh Choirs in most communities in the many valleys of Wales beginning in the 19th Century.

It is generally acknowledged that part singing began as early as the 12th century in Wales as opposed to unison singing which was done elsewhere.

The special harmony and enthusiasm can be heard at rugby games as well as in concert halls, churches, and pubs throughout Wales.

The Bois Afan Choir is from Port Talbot, Wales. They have sung together for 28 years throughout the British Isles and in many other European countries.

Their repertoire includes popular music from the 30's through the 60's and from musicals and films in addition to traditional Welsh music.

The choir's first appearance in the United States is at the invitation of the Sarasota International Cricket Club and the Gulf Coast Welsh Society.

## Kayak Outing on the Intracoastal Waterway in Nokomis

f you missed our kayak outing last fall or were one of our paddlers who were disappointed due to unfavorable weather this past spring, here's another opportunity to experience our next silent seas adventure. We'll again attempt to undertake a "Waterways of Nokomis" outing with our professional guide, John Sarkozy, who has nearly 20 years of experience in running local kayak trips under the auspices of the American Littoral Society <u>http://</u> www.littoralsociety.org/index.php/trips-a-events/sarasota.

The trip will be at a leisurely pace on a North to South figure -eight route among the small islands, mangroves and sand bars dotting the Intra-Coastal Waterway along Casey Key. There will be one "wilderness stop" during our three-hour journey of paddling and observation.

DATE and TIME: Wednesday, **November 12**, 2014. Please arrive by **9am** to be prepared for our launching at 9:30 and returning about 12:30pm.

DIRECTIONS to the Launch Site: In Nokomis on Rt 41 turn west onto Albee Rd, proceed 0.9 miles over the ICW bridge, turn right onto Casey Key Rd. and then immediately turn right around a wooden & chain link fence and then over a short bridge and finally turn left continuing along the dirt road approx. 0.1 miles to a break in the mangroves on the left marked by wooden fencing.

John provides all the necessary equipment and safety gear and especially welcomes first time kayakers. As he did for several newbies last year, he'll have you quite comfortable on the water in a matter of minutes. He can accommodate up to 11 paddlers in single kayaks and two-somes in up to three double (tandem) kayaks or 17 guests in total.

Fees are \$25 per person, \$20 if you are a member of ALS or \$5 if you bring your own kayak and life vest. Suggested per-
