President's Letter

Having just returned from 4 weeks in England, Jane and I have gradually settled into normal sleep patterns and re-adjusted to the local time zone. We've also had time to reflect on our adventures along the way, which were



overwhelmingly positive. Foremost in the negative column, was the long-agreed upon plan upon landing at Gatwick Airport (from Tampa) to strike out immediately by hired car for the Lake District, a distance of considerable miles. (Yes, we had done that some years ago with ease; but in the interim, both age and UK traffic volume have notably increased). At any rate, we started out well; but lost time due to our being in the wrong lane of the M25 in morning rush hour traffic and erroneously exited. We managed to correct that error after a few miles and re-entered the M25. Life looked good for several hours and we stopped for a meal at one of the services location on the M6. Upon leaving there, we discovered there that our UK cell phone battery had failed. That cell phone contained the telephone number of the B&B we had reserved for the evening. We could handle that, we reasoned, once we arrived in Keswick in the Lakes several hours onward.

Cruel Fate then intervened in the form of a dead stop/delay on the motorway for more than 2 hours due to a traffic accident some miles ahead. Ever optimistic, about 3 hours later we reached the turn off the M6 for our B&B, a distance away. We found the B&B's driving instructions most arcane and evidently took the wrong exit at a small roundabout and found ourselves on a very narrow road. Except for our auto headlights, everything was pitch black as there was no moonlight. After some time, we finally managed to retrace our steps and get back on the M6 (in the wrong direction, unfortunately); and had to drive many miles before being able to rectify that error. All these delays meant we finally arrived in Keswick after 1 a.m and were unable to find the B&B as it was some miles outside the town on unlighted roads. The final blow was that there were NO accommodations to be had in Keswick as we found out when dragging our cases through the town in the wee hours. There, by pure chance, we encountered the night manager of one of the hotels who confirmed there was no room in any inn. He knew this because his hotel owns all the others in town.

Thus thoroughly defeated, we resigned ourselves to bunking down in the car on a quiet side street for the night. At sunrise, we struck out for our B&B (The

Dancing Beck), which we did find with a bit of help; enjoyed a full English breakfast prepared by the delightful owner; and then retired upstairs for a well-deserved sleep. We'd certainly stay there again. We enjoyed two weeks in the Lakes and North Yorkshire at several locations blessed with plentiful sunshine and perfect for invigorating walks and exploration. Thereafter, all went well aside from a few navigational errors in getting to our friends in the greater London area; but that's another story! Suffice it to say, we did stay with two old friends, one in Surrey, the other on the border of Kent for several days each. Both our friends know London very well. We went by train to London nearly every day; travelled about widely on foot; and were taken to sites and delightful eateries we would not have seen otherwise. Too, we managed to take in five West End shows—once, two in a day. Who could ask for anything more?

November's Recipe

Hot Berry Charlotte

1 cup blackcurrants/blackberries

- 1 cup mixed raspberries, blackberries or blueberries
- $^{1}/_{2}$ cup fresh, white, rough texture breadcrumbs (crusts optional)
- 2 Tbsp butter
- 3 Tbsp brown sugar
- 2 Tbsp water

Custard sauce or cream for pouring when serving

Preheat oven to 400F. If using fresh fruit, remove the stalks. Put all the fruit in the baking dish and add 2 Tbsp for our raffle? The water. Melt the butter in a small pan and stir the support the Club's breadcrumbs and sugar in. Stir briefly over medium heat, until you see the crumbs take on a golden colour, about 20 minutes. Tip the crumb mix loosely over the fruit, but don't pat them down. Bake in preheated oven for 20 minutes, by which time the fruit should have burst and be bubbling through the crumbs. Serve hot with cream or custard.

he Club heard that member ▲ Iris Martin had passed away and there was this obituary in the Herald Tribune Sept 12-13th.

Martin, Iris M. Aug. 3, 1918 - Sep. 6, 2015 Iris M. Martin, 97, a twenty year resident of Village Gardens, in Sarasota, died on Sept. 06, 2015 following a massive stroke. Iris' family name was Jago, a name



family descended from a Spanish officer who was recall many years ago arriving at the turnstiles when captured during the Spanish Armada in 1588. Iris was the attendant greeted him with: "That will be ten born in Essex, England. She was in London during the Blitz and enlisted in the Royal Air Force. She was posted to Egypt and for many years lived in the Middle East. In addition to Egypt, she served in Iran, Lebanon, Afghanistan, India, Yemen and Bahrain. After military service, Iris worked as an airline stewardess and traveled to over eighty countries. Iris married Ronnie Martin and they lived in San Paulo, Brazil and Beirut, Lebanon. After Ronnie died, Iris joined the Peace Corps. She also worked for nineteen years with the U. S. State Department and with the U.S. Information Services. Iris had an abiding love for animals. She was especially fond of dachshunds and owned several over the years. She was particularly interested in the Brooks Animal Hospital in London and supported them generously. Iris had many close friends and neighbors in Village Gardens and she was assiduous in maintaining contact with her numerous friends from around the world. She will be mourned by all. She is survived by her Goddaughter, Shelagh Blundell of Berkeley, New South Wales, Australia. Per her request, there will be no services.

Pendle in Lancashire had the highest anxiety levels, the Office for National statistics poll of 165,000 adults said.

The ONS also warned the data suggested a "growing inequality" between people rating their lives highly and those reporting low levels of well-being.

It said ministers needed to consider how to address this apparent disparity.

People were questioned on four measures of wellbeing: Happiness, life satisfaction, feeling life was worthwhile and anxiety.

The ONS said personal well-being had risen every year since 2011/12 when data was first collected, with the greatest improvement for levels of anxiety.

But the proportion of people giving the highest ratings for well-being increased "significantly" in the financial year to 2015, while the decreases in low well-being "were small" in comparison.

"It indicates that while improvements are widespread across the population, they are uneven," said the ONS.

Northern Ireland recorded higher average ratings for The happiest place in the UK is the area of well-being for all measures except anxiety, which the ONS says has been the case for the past four years.

Wales was the only country to not have any Meanwhile, Bolsover in Derbyshire came lowest for significant improvement in the last financial year, according to the ONS.

Londoners reported lower well-being than the UK averages, but have seen improvements in each of the four measures since the survey was first carried out. Glenn Everett, ONS director of well-being, said: "Overall, people are generally rating their lives higher than they did four years ago.

"But what is interesting is that they show a slight growth in inequality between people rating their lives highly and those reporting low levels of personal well-being... a growing inequality that policy makers need to consider."
