MILK

Food Spoilage Guide, A Guide For The Rest Of Us! (Finally, a way to know what to pitch and what to save!)

THE GAG TEST—Anything that makes you gag is spoiled (except for leftovers from what you cooked for yourself last night).

EGGS—When something starts pecking its way out of the shell, the egg is probably past its prime.

EXPIRATION DATES -This is NOT a marketing ploy to encourage you to throw away perfectly good food so that you'll spend more on groceries. Perhaps you'd benefit by having a calendar in your kitchen.

DAIRY PRODUCTS- Milk is spoiled when it starts to look like yogurt. Yogurt is spoiled when it starts to look like cottage cheese. Cottage cheese is spoiled when it starts to look like regular cheese. Regular cheese is nothing but spoiled milk anyway and can't get any more spoiled than it is already. Cheddar cheese is spoiled when you think it is blue cheese but you realize you've never purchased that kind.

MAYONNAISE- If it makes you violently ill after you eat ¹ it, the mayonnaise is spoiled.

UNMARKED ITEMS


You know it is well beyond prime when you're tempted to discard the Tupperware along with the food. Generally speaking, Tupperware containers should not burp when you open them.

A Club member and electric vehicle owner-enthusiast traces the history of the EV through several rises and falls from the turn of the 19th century to the present day. The chronological journey offers insights into the earliest motorized 'contraptions', the first 'steamers', 'combustions' and 'crude electrics'; the impact of the Ford Model T on the early EV movement and the roles that batteries and the AC motor play in advancing electric mobility.

The story recounts the intrigues behind the "War of the Currents" between Thomas Edison (DC) and Nikola Tesla (AC) and the strange, short life of GM's "Cult Car", the EV1 — why it was killed and who-by and the subsequent arrival of the foreign hybrids and their US rivals.

An introduction to the infrastructure used to charge EVs both at home and on the road prefaces a summary of the **five** issues the Presenter believes will influence the future success of EVs: Advocacy, Awareness of Environmental Impacts, Advances in Technology, Alternative Transport Modes and Acceptance by the Mainstream.
