A number of us had a great evening recently at Soma Creekside in Bradenton, with your President responsible for the evening's entertainment in the form of a bunch of meaningless trivia questions. Music, particularly, has always taken me back to when and where I heard it and the time in my life that is associated with that particular song.

The song intros that I chose were framed from that year of 1957 until 1974, an era of great music and wonderful musicians. There was some Motown that evoked memories of hearing "This Old Heart of Mine" by the Isley Brothers for the first time, as well as "Magic Moments" by Perry Como that was a staple of the Home Service on a Sunday Morning (was it Housewives Choice?).

I'm sure that we all have music intertwined in our lives at times (Recipe from Sandra Cherry, Union Jack Food Columnist) of love, of fear and of friendship, with The Beatles, The Stones and The Who tussling with Barry White, Al Green and Marvin Gave to mark these moments for me.

It is only when I consciously look through the collection of music available to me (which is fairly ubiquitous in this digital age), that I take the time to relive some of those moments and think to myself how great it was to hear that song for the very first time. Without wishing to sound too much like my Dad, I hope that kids today are able to experience that delicious frisson that we've all felt over our lives. If they don't, then we've

certainly lost something of importance, not least the context in which we can recall our lives.

#### SANDRA'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH

(Apologies for incorrect measurement for last month's recipe, should have been 1 ½ lb of potatoes)

Apples should be well in season now, and I used to love toffee apples....but not the US soft toffee kind, I like the hard crunch outside with the crisp apple inside, fun to



Scots Corner and Public carry the Lyles ( used to be Tate & Lyles) golden syrup which make all the difference.

#### Toffee Apples

1 lb light brown sugar ½ cup water 2 Tbs Lyles Golden Syrup 1/8 tsp cream of tartar 2 Tbsp vinegar

4 Tbsp butter ( not margarine, or it won't set) 8 medium sized apples



Dissolve the sugar and water in a large heavy saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly. Add the syrup, cream of tartar and vinegar. Boil three minutes, stirring.

Add the butter, small pieces at a time and stir in. Boil 1 minutes stirring frequently, until it reaches the hard crack stage, Or 290 degrees on a candy thermometer. Insert a wooden stick into the centre of the washed and dried apples, and dip quickly into the toffee mixture so the whole apple is covered, Place on a well greased baking sheet and leave to set and harden.

#### **Kayaking on the Bay**

The Bay beckons adventurous souls for a three-hour jaunt on the low seas! Our excursion begins at the water's end of Vamo Drive, a RIGHT turn nine-tenths of a mile down Vamo Road from its intersection with RT 41 and Beneva Road. You will be met by our professional guide John Sarkozy, who has many years of experience running local kayak trips under the auspices of the American Littoral Society http:// littoralsociety.org and our Event Coordinator, Mark Malkasian. Please arrive by 8:30am on Saturday, October 26, 2013 with launching planned for 9am.

The route will take us at its furthest point to Palmer Point Park, normally only accessible by boat or foot, on the southern end of Siesta Key http://www.discovernaturalsarasota.org/listing/palmerpoint-park-siesta-key. In addition to our visit to the park, there will be upwards of two stops - usually one at Bay Preserve in Osprey where there are rest rooms – during the round trip. Our return to launch point should be approximately at noon.

John provides all the necessary equipment and safety gear and especially welcomes first time kayakers on his silent seas adventures. In a matter of minutes he'll have you quite comfortable on the water. He can accommodate up to 11 paddlers in single kayaks and two-somes in up to three double kayaks or 17 guests in total.

Fees are \$25 per person, \$5 if you are a member of ALS or \$5 if you bring your own kayak. Recommended personal items are: a sun hat, plenty of water, sunscreen, quick-dry clothing and shoes that you don't mind getting wet. John usually has granola bars for the Park stop.

Après-kayaking we will adjourn for lunch at a nearby eatery most likely on Rt 41.

A lot has been said in the news from Europe about the financial crisis and unemployment. Around the city there were beggars and people bedded down in doorways, but you can also see that in Sarasota. I haven't yet seen in Sarasota, old women beggars of (apparently) 80 plus years or people roaming the streets pulling a small cart, stopping at large trash bins and deftly checking them for retrievable items.

It was very noticeable that there was a lot of graffiti. Perhaps it is a side effect of a poor economy, inevitably there is less money available for a cleanup.

The Weather

Similar temperatures to Sarasota but without rain, so the reduced humidity made it pleasant to stroll almost at any time of day. For better or worse there would be no snowbirds if Florida experienced the same weather!

The Lifestyle

I love my (generally) retired Florida lifestyle but I also like the cafe -style I saw in Spain. There were thousands of people dining outside until after midnight and, unlike Florida, dining often didn't start until 9pm. To me the downside was that the reason al fresco dining is SO popular , is because cigarette smoking is prolific and is not permitted inside. Normally I was the only person eating inside the restaurant.
