### President's Letter

This space was vacant in May as Jane and I were away on a superb holiday in South Africa. That trip was long in the planning and had been on our travel wish list for some years. Our two weeks in this large, vibrant country (roughly the combined size of France



and Spain) with very dramatic and ever-changing landscapes, very hospitable people AND excellent cuisine in lovely settings did not disappoint. We chose the daily non-stop flight on Delta from Atlanta to Johannesburg, which takes 14 hours and passes through six time zones. We elected to take this long flight rather than going through a connecting flight in Europe. The non-stop return flight from Johannesburg to Atlanta takes 15 hours due to prevailing eastward head winds. These are lengthy flights to be sure, but bearable; and the flight attendants' service was quite good throughout. However, being seated just a few feet from the curtained-off cabin providing upscale food, drink, service and assorted creature comforts to Business Class passengers does encourage fantasies in one's mind of being able to move up to the big leagues, so to speak.

We arrived at the very modern OR Tambo International Airport near Johannesburg; collected our luggage; went through passport control and eventually entered the large and crowded arrival hall. The first qualm was "will there actually be a tour representative here to meet us?" As if on cue, a placard was raised bearing our names and a warm and friendly guide from our tour firm introduced himself. What a relief! We were whisked away to the car park, loaded into a van and regaled with interesting conversation and on what to expect while we made the 90 minute trip to our first night's lodging and fine dinner. Following breakfast the next morning, we were driven by another gregarious guide, Pedro, to a regional airport nearby and flown to lovely Cape Town, some 750 miles south and on the southern tip of Africa and the location of the famous Cape of Good Hope. Cape Town sits at the foot of spectacular Table Mountain, which towers 3,500 feet above sea level and can be most easily enjoyed by cable car. The views of the city below and of the Cape of Good Hope should not be missed. The city is a mixture of modern high risers and quaint well-maintained architecture from earlier periods. The public transportation system is excellent.

Again, we were met by our guide for the next week, John Pierre, familiarly known as "JP," who proved to be a font of information on Cape Town specifically and on South Africa in general. Our home there was a nice, fully-equipped 2 bedroom/2 bath unit in an apartment complex near the city. At the complex we joined a delightful Canadian couple whose tour itinerary was identical to ours. For the next week JP escorted the four of us around Cape Town and environs, picking us up early morning for breakfast, and delivering us back to relax before going out for dinner in the evening. Lunch was also provided mid-day—all lovely dining locations with wonderful food beautifully served. In addition to Cape Town itself, we toured

several wineries (with tastings of course) with outstanding gardens, lovely sculptures and superb food in elegant surroundings. (Do you recognize a theme here?) We also enjoyed seeing hundreds of South African Penguins (an endangered species) at Table Mountain National Park, which were thriving on wind-sheltered beaches.

Following the week in Cape Town, we flew back to OR Tambo Airport, where the afore-mentioned guide, Pedro, met us, the two earlier Canadians and 2 additional Canadians who now joined us for our safari tour. We all melded perfectly. We were now at a higher altitude and South Africa being below the equator, was entering its autumn; hence the air was a bit chilly; but comfortable with a light jacket or sweater. On the way eastward to Kampama Game Park for the safari portion of our trip, we stayed in several locations, including 2 nights in large charming bedrooms with fireplaces, which were lit for us while at dinner. The views along the route were awe-inspiring at times, imposing mountain ranges and very tall, beautifully- colored escarpments, some with waterfalls. At lower altitudes, the land had gentle hills and small mountains, very reminiscent of England's Lake District. It was also a bit nerve-racking at times, travelling in the 3 row van in the cliff-side lane when ascending or descending a mountain. One particularly harrowing incident in the van was being on the side of a narrow road and facing oncoming traffic while waiting out a sudden and blinding downpour at sunset—first rain and then large hail stones. I was convinced a multi-car collision was likely to occur at any time. Fortunately, the storm abated and we continued our journey without incident. I was a much happier person at that point! For the safari portion of our South African adventures we stayed at the lovely Kapama Lodge within the Kapama Private Game Reserve near Kruger National Park. accommodations were superb and the dining room food and service were excellent. Afternoon tea and cakes abounded. We undertook 2 safari game drives each day: 6:30-9:30 a.m. and 4-7 p.m. We were 6-8 in 3 row open vehicles. Our very pleasant driver was a trained naturalist and we had a guide at the very front of the vehicle as well. Over the 4 days we were on safari, we saw multitudes of game animals very up close, including the Big Five: water buffaloes, elephants, lions, rhinos, and a leopard

(which are very elusive). Also hippos, crocodiles, zebras,

giraffes, gazelles, monkeys and others, including a number of

birds. A special treat was an elephant safari—a hour's ride on an

elephant, trekking over open terrain, which was a great

experience. If you ever have the opportunity to take such a ride,

I highly recommend you choose to do it.





Recently at a Brit Club luncheon I asked some members what recipes they would like to see featured and a couple asked for Yorkshire Pudding. Although it has been featured in the past, I know we have newer members, and I have had requests for it before. When Jack and I were at a Yorkshire Autumn Flower Show a few years back, we were amazed at the variety of fillings that were used at the food tent, with a large plate sized Yorkshire pudding shell, included things like baked beans, proper chips, apples and sugar, chili and even curry! I stick to just making Toad in the Hole now, as I rarely do a full roast anymore. Hope you enjoy my version, it never fails! Just make sure the fat you are baking it in is hot, and you rest the batter before baking.

### **Yorkshire Pudding**

1 cup all purpose flour 1/2 tsp salt 1 cup milk 2 eggs



Beat all ingredients thoroughly, and let rest an hour before baking. Heat oven to 400F, and preheat fat a few minutes ( I still keep a 'dripping' bowl which is best, but shortening will work too) Carefully pour batter onto heated fat, and bake about 30-40 minutes, or until golden brown and puffed up. Serve immediately.




