Potato dishes are so versatile and we certainly have a huge variety in British cooking. I always liked the name of this dish, which is attributed to the north of England, and it is very easy to make



| 1 Tbsp butter | 1 medium onion |
| 1 Tbsp Vegetable Oil | 1 cup grated cheddar cheese |
| 1 lb potatoes (Idaho are best) | Salt and Pepper |



Peel and slice the potatoes and onions thinly. Heat the butter and oil in a heavy based frying pan. Remove from the heat. Place ingredients in layers, potato, onion and grated cheese, seasoning with salt and pepper between layers, and ending with a top layer of cheese. Cover, and cook gently over medium heat about 30 minutes, or until the potatoes and onions are almost cooked....not too soft. Uncover, and brown the dish under a grill/broiler, and serves straight from the pan. Yield 4 servings.

New Year brings a sense of new beginnings; a new circle in our lives, like the ring on a tree trunk. Draw a large circle on paper using a plate, or saucer, then for each New Year's resolution create a symbol/color in your mind. From the circle's center on outwards, or however you choose, begin to draw a design using these symbols/colors – it could be circular patterns, colored rays, geometric shapes.

The result will be a personal Mandala to remind you of those resolutions throughout the year. Mandala is from Sanskrit representing full circle or wholeness within the body/mind and beyond, and can be used to tweek our memory, support us in meditation, and as a meaningful reflection of ourselves.

Books

Two books with similarities

"I'm a stranger here myself" by Bill Bryson ISBN 0-7679-0381-1. Hardback \$25

A collection of his humorous musings, written in 1999 for a UK newspaper column when he returned to live in the USA after living in the UK. Readers who have lived in both those places will easily recognise the points he makes, sometimes using a bit of whimsy.

"Queenan Country" by Joe Queenan, ISBN 080506980-1 2004, \$22

Married to an English wife, he visits the UK to try to understand the way of life, history and eccentricities.

The book is not without humour e.g. "From the English I had learned to take pleasure in small things, like a nice cup of tea or twenty minutes of direct sunlight". However it was spoilt by the over-use of less usual words.

The author must have had a dictionary for Christmas (or you might wish you'd received one), for example in three consecutive sentences he uses the words oracular, recondite and insolite!
