MEDIA MATTERS

I am guessing that many members have time on your hands, so here is a recap of ideas that will help you fill your days and nights.

Reading

Kindle Unlimited is a feature of *Amazon* that allows unlimited access to thousands of magazines and books for \$9.99 per month.

Sarasota Public Library has a free service that allows rental of eBooks for 14 days. It is a bit complicated to use, and requires two different apps (one to search, and one to read). There is often a months-long wait for popular titles, which is a bummer. But hey! It's FREE!

TV

First, if you have been holding out, now is the time to consider a subscription to *Amazon Prime* and *Netflix*. There are a TON of other subscription services, but for most of us, these two should be sufficient. You need a device to access the internet with both (an iPad or other tablet will work) and an internet enabled TV. We have a '*smart tv*' that is directly connected to the internet via an ethernet cable, but I know many people who use a Fire stick, Google dongle, or other device.

If you have a recent DVD player, it may also have WiFi that will allow you to access the internet.

Netflix

A reminder, that recent releases are available from Netflix via their excellent *mail order system*. Costs a bit more, but is worth it to get the good stuff!

I have recommended *Outlander* before; the first 3 series are available here and should not be missed!

The new season of *Ozark* started March 27th and is a slick, darkly humorous drama about an accountant who gets sucked into money laundering for a Mexican drug cartel. Highly recommended.

Also on Netflix is **Shaun the Sheep** – a series of 13-minute animated tales from the studios that produce Wallace and Grommit. Excellent fun!

The English Game is a tale about the origins of football (soccer) from the Downton Abbey team, including Julian Fellowes. Manages to mix the Victorian period piece with an underdog soccer team struggling to win the first FA Cup. Not bad.

I notice that all 8 seasons of *Call the Midwife* are available. Not my cup of tea, but I know that this is hugely popular in the UK and you may well get sucked into binge watching!

Netflix, also has quite a few *Attenborough* nature specials, every one is spectacular.

Amazon

A reminder, that *Amazon Prime* has the ability to add '*Channels*' within the Prime app. Some of them offer a free month teaser, and may be worth a look.

We have *Acorn*, which for \$4 per month offers a TON of classic British shows including *Doc Martin, Lovejoy, Vera* etc. There are 5 series of 'Line of Duty', which should not be missed!

Other available Channels include *BritBox*, which has many of the same shows as Acorn, but costs a little more. It is a joint venture between the BBC and ITV, which means that it has current series of shows such as *Eastenders*, *Coronation Street* etc.

Starz (which has the recent series, 4 and 5, of *Outlander*) is a \$9 per month, but worth it for a month to watch Outlander!

HBO is available also, for \$14.99 per month, which is the same as Comcast. We have HBO included in our cable package and are re-watching **Game of Thrones** from the first episodes in 2010! We are thoroughly enjoying them, finding that they are easier to understand the second time around.

Let's not forget *Westworld*, spectacular but sometimes puzzling.

From your editor: A Sniper in The Rookery

Dear everyone: on occasions life gives us the opportunity to witness or participate in something we deeply value. For me at the time it was the experience of visiting a sacred place: the Flamingo Rookery at the Inagua National Park in The Bahamas.

In March 2009, my camera and I were invited to visit the rookery located next to a remote lake in the park; it seemed to be a successful nesting season that year, a rebound after lke, the devastating hurricane that hit the island the year before.

The flamingo parents got up and walked away from the nests when Henry Nixon, the Park Warden and I arrived, despite us sneaking carefully behind the mangroves. Henry was promptly guiding my steps and my aim: "to the right Olga, to the left, look up!" while I had the camera glued to my face shooting as fast as I could. Just when I started to get the hang of it, he said: "enough, we are leaving now; the parents must return to incubate the eggs and feed the chicks".

It was a half-hour visit, but it felt like I was floating in the air for only a few seconds, with the sound of the camera, shooting incessantly.

Life in the rookery went back to normal as soon as we left, but my life was changed forever.





The parents kept walking nervously by the edge of the lake, with their necks erect on alert, attentive to our every movement. They instinctively fear humans.

Look at their legs: the one with the grey and green bands was 30 years old at the time; Henry Nixon banded him when he was a chick!

Flamingos live in large colonies; the male and female build their nest together with mud and take turns to protect the nest and the egg. They also feed the chick with a kind of milk produced in glands lining their upper digestive tract.

The new hatchlings remain in the nest for about ten days; after that, they stand up and attempt their first steps; in a few more days the chicks gather in small groups and eventually merge into groups of thousands. Safety in numbers once again.





The chicks are born with white/grey feathers but their plumage changes colour in a few years due to the brine shrimp in their diet.

The Flamingos that inhabit South Florida and the Caribbean belong to the American Flamingo species and are usually non-migratory birds.

They only move far away due to a threat. Many survive the hurricanes hunkering down on the mangroves.

In December, thousands of adults congregate in Great Inagua Island for the mating rituals and another nesting season begins.

The crisis has brought disruption to every section of society. From schoolchildren to the elderly, and from the self-employed to the abruptly furloughed, all of us are facing upheaval in our daily lives and anxiety about our futures.

Amid the clamour of appeal for Government support, however, the plight of one group appears to have been cruelly overlooked:

Criminals.

The Prime Minister may only have <u>announced the nationwide lockdown</u> Monday night, but already families from across the law-breaking community are feeling the pinch. Burglars, for example, have seen their takings collapse.

"It's a nightmare," says Barry Knuckles, president of the National Union of Housebreakers. "Now that the entire population is at home 24 hours a day, it's impossible to burgle anyone. They're never out."

Speaking on the Today programme, Mr. Knuckles urged the Government to provide financial support for his members during these tough times. He called on the Chancellor to cover 80 per cent of the value of all the laptops, jewellery and flatscreen TVs that Britain's burglars would normally have stolen and sold on. So far, however, he has yet to receive a response.

"The political class are completely out of touch with the concerns of decent, hardworking criminals," he says.

But burglars aren't the only felons struggling to meet the challenges of the coronavirus age.

"It's all very well for people who can work from home, like phishing scammers and identity thieves," says Dave Fingers, chairman of the Association of British Muggers and Bag-Snatchers. "But how are you supposed to pick someone's pocket from two metres away? Some of our lads have tried using those little hooked rods you get in fairground hook-a-duck games, or those funny reacher-grabber tools that old folk use for picking up stuff they've dropped on the floor. But it's hopeless. The Government's got to think again."

The spread of the virus has also caused widespread concern among the Jihadi terrorist community. According to recent newspaper reports, Isil has ordered its members <u>to stay</u> away from Europe for fear of catching the disease.

"We're disgusted by the number of Western infidels refusing to observe official guidance on social distancing," says an Isil spokesman. "These people are making the streets completely unsafe. Their actions could cost thousands of innocent lives.

"As an employer, our number one concern is the welfare of our employees. The last thing we want is for one of our suicide bombers to get killed."
