NEWS FROM OUR MEMBERS

From BritClub member Steve Adams:

"Last year, on July 1, I was driving in my neighborhood. I'd been out for an hour or so but felt uncomfortable. My heart seemed to be racing a touch, so I looked down at my newly-acquired Apple Watch and checked my heart rate. That normally reads around 68-74, so I was somewhat taken aback by a reading of 185. I even shook my watch to check if it was a misreading! Doh! There's something about having visual evidence that all is not well, so I couldn't ignore my lyin' eyes. Stubbornly, the reading stayed around that level for another half hour and I decided to go home and sleep it off, in the completely ridiculous belief that this may help. But as I approached my house, I felt an urge to call my doctor and pulled over less than 200 yards from my door. She told me in no uncertain terms to get myself to the Emergency Room. That didn't help. The reading, which had "subsided" to 164, shot straight back up.

Calling my partner, Dana, on the way, I arrived at the ER and staggered into reception, now doubled up in pain. They took me immediately and I felt my heart slowing quickly (great oxymoron). They checked me in, put me in a room, did a number of tests, kept me overnight, then discharged me the following day. Curiously, they couldn't find a reason for the rapid heart rate. A week later, I asked my Doctor if there was any cardiac reason I shouldn't do a 75-hike the following month through the Californian wilderness that would take me ultimately to the top of Mt Whitney, at over

14,500 ft, the highest point in the lower 48 states. He told me that he wouldn't do it but, no, there was no cardiac reason for me NOT to do it. So, two months to the day after my hospital stay, I got to the top of Whitney, checking my heart rate on my watch every minute or so. Anytime it went above 150, I'd stop, breathe deeply, then continue once I was back in the low 130s. I never deviated from this practice. The point of my story is that there are myriad reasons NOT to do something. But the only reason that counts is your own. I listened to advice, I took onboard the various factors, then I executed my plan to achieve my goal. Had I not done that, I'd never be able to share the picture below. We only got this one time. Make it count."



From BritClub member Sioux Faragher-Hurley:

Almost the same size as the city of London, Dartmoor covers 468 square miles and measures 20 miles across. Many in the area are reluctant to cross the moors, especially at night, for fear of being seen by 'Old Crockern', the mythological protector of the moor. With skin like granite and hair made from ragged mosses, Old Crockern is the embodiment of the landscape. Astride his skeletal steed, he leads his hounds in pursuit of unwary travellers, reminding them that the soul of Dartmoor cannot be tamed.

The Guardian Spirit of the moor was summoned as recently as January of this year but in order to understand the significance, one needs to know the legend. Local folklore concerns a farmer who moves to the area seeking to cultivate the moor and add to his fortune. From the vantage point of Crockern Tor, his ambition is matched only by his greed and he vows to make this barren land productive, proving himself better than the backward locals.

Just as the time comes to finalise his plans, the farmer meets a local man who has received a chilling warning from Old Crockern in a dream. The Guardian Spirit of Dartmoor is aware of the greedy farmer's plans, and he warns that "If the farmer as much as scratches his back with a plough, he'll tear his pockets out."

The farmer scoffs at the warning, never having seen any sign of a supernatural figure at Crockern Tor. Over time, the ambitious farmer's harvests become poorer and poorer and the long months spent cultivating the moor drain him of money and energy. Finally, he is forced to leave, a broken man and painfully aware that Old Crockern has been true to his promise.

Until recently, the right to freely camp in Dartmoor National Park in Devon without seeking the landowner's permission was assumed to be protected by a local bylaw. That right was overturned earlier this year when Dartmoor's sixth-largest landowner won a court case against the Park Authority in which he argued that the right to freely camp in the park had never existed. This sparked huge protests; the more spiritual among them hoping to invoke Old Crockern in their fight against the landowner.

With pressure from the Open Spaces Society, Right to Roam and The Stars Are For Everyone organisation, the DNPA agreed to appeal. On July 31, 2023, three judges who heard the case at the Court of Appeal ruled unanimously to overturn the original ruling.

Do you believe in the legend of the Moor? Did Old Crockern have a hand in this outcome?

Malcolm and Rita Barry; they have been in Sarasota for over twenty years, since Rita was offered a job.


Jan Hardman; Born in the USA but became interested in the UK through the Beatles! So, went to the University of Essex and then joined the US State Department.
